TITLE OF KEYNOTE PRESENTATION

The (second language) play's the thing

ABSTRACT:

Sometimes when we think of drama we think of complex archaic language, or if, like me, you went to primary school in Britain in the 1970's, you may think of standing for what seemed like hours and being a tree! But drama as a tool for learning can be a much more straightforward and down-to-earth matter. It's something that can be incorporated into almost every lesson, and it doesn't necessarily require acting skills, or lots of time or practice. Having said that, its potential to promote learning is high. It's a great way to bring to life the language in the coursebook and to make it meaningful and memorable, and on top of all this it is fun. In this interactive plenary, I'll reflect on my experiences as both a language learner and teacher, and propose a strong rationale for the practice and performance of scripted dialogues and sketches as a core component within a modern, lexical (Lewis 1993) or 'play' based (Cook 2000) syllabus.

TITLE OF WORKSHOP:

Training to teach for autonomy

ABSTRACT:

Engaging students, motivating them to use English in class and managing this motivation are some of the biggest challenges a teacher of English faces, especially in primary education where listening and speaking are the main skills being developed. Four important questions, *What? How? Why?* and *How well?* will form the basis of this short workshop session with a view to preparing trainers to help teachers engage and motivate their learners to become autonomous, reflective and confident language users.

TITLE OF KEYNOTE PRESENTATION:

Reimagining the power of pictures and words: Picturebooks in language education.

ABSTRACT:

Using authentic literature is an accepted approach in language education but picturebooks, a form of children's literature, tend to be associated with younger learners. In this plenary I shall demonstrate that there is potential in picturebooks for teachers and their learners of all ages, from pre-primary through to secondary and even tertiary education. Sharing a number of examples I will encourage participants to reimagine the power of picturebooks. It's quite simple really! I will share picturebooks that can be used to support language development, critical thinking and intercultural understanding ... all through the inter-animation of pictures, words and the gaps between.

Improving Writing Skills through Scaffolding and Collaborative Writing Activities ABSTRACT:

This workshop will show the nature of group work when students produce jointly written texts in a ESL classroom. It follows an exploratory action research process. Surveys, journals, rubrics were used for reflection and decision making. The study found that group work produced better texts in terms of task fulfilment, grammatical accuracy, and complexity when writing activities are organized systematically (Prewriting, Drafting, Revising, Editing and Publishing), as well as, following a genre-based teaching methodology (The hamburger model).
